#### **BRAZOS COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT**

#### REGULAR MEETING

A regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court of Brazos County, Texas was held in the Brazos County Commissioners Courtroom in the Administration Building, 200 South Texas Avenue, in Bryan, Brazos County, Texas, beginning at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, February 28, 2017 with the following members of the Court present:

Duane Peters, County Judge, Presiding; Steve Aldrich, Commissioner of Precinct 1; Sammy Catalena, Commissioner of Precinct 2; Nancy Berry, Commissioner of Precinct 3; Irma Cauley, Commissioner of Precinct 4; Karen McQueen, County Clerk.

The attached sheets contain the names of the citizens and officials that were in attendance.

There was no citizen's input.

3. Presentations and/or Discussions

Presentation by Rebecca Dudensing for the results of the FY2016 Economic Impact Analysis for the Brazos County Exposition Complex.

Brazos County Expo Complex Director Tom Quarles introduced Dr. Rebekka Dudensing. Dr. Dudensing reported a total of \$7,630,100 economic impact to the

community along with 77.9 jobs added.

Mr. Quarles stated he expects to grow each year and that an impact study should be conducted each year.

Commissioner Aldrich asked about direct hotel occupancy tax and if Dr. Dudensing could add that to future reports.

Dr. Dudensing stated she could include that in the future reports. She also said that there were 11,200 nights of local lodging and 1.47 million in lodging with 7% collected as county hotel tax.

Commissioner Aldrich asked if they used the Industry Standard Calculator by the Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Dr. Dudensing said that type of calculator does not cover the same type of events that are hosted at the Expo.

Commissioner Aldrich also asked if there was a comparison between other facilities and the Brazos County Expo.

Mr. Quarles said that the Expo business model is to be the best in the business. He went on to say it is hard to compare to other facilities because they all operate differently depending upon the size of the city, types of events and lodging accommodations. He said that the Brazos County Expo has a reward program but horse and livestock shows are different than conferences. The people who attend a horse or livestock show look for their own rooms and do not typically reserve from a block of rooms. Mr. Quarles also stated that hotel rates are a limiting factor, especially during football season, graduation ceremonies, parents weekend, etc. taking place at Texas A&M University.

Commissioner Aldrich commented that he has been impressed by the organization and cleanliness of the facility at the many events he has attended at the Expo. He thanked Mr. Quarles for all his hard work.

Commissioner Cauley questioned what portion Brazos County is paying after the agreement is signed.

Judge Peters explained that College Station Independent School District will be reimbursing at one hundred (100) percent.

Commissioner Catalena said that they will be monitoring it closely so that Brazos County is not out any money.

Order 17-001 declaring the funding of the School Resource Deputy positions and fringe benefits per the Interlocal Agreement between Brazos County and the College Station Independent School District an emergency expenditure as an amendment to the original budget per Section 111.70 of the Local Government Code effective March 1, 2017.

Judge Peters stated that this is the method for funding resource officers since it was not considered at the Budget Meeting.

Bill Ballard explained to the Court the events leading up to this point and the conditions for amending the budget. Mr. Ballard went on to explain the law and how this fits the rare circumstance definition. Mr. Ballard stated he believes the Court is justified in considering this motion.



#### PUBLIC COMMENTS

Public Comment during the Commission Meeting may be for all matters, both on and off the agenda, and be limited to four minutes per person. Persons are invited to submit comments in writing on the agenda items and/or attend and make comment at the Commission meeting. Members of the public are reminded that the Brazos County Commissioners Court is a Constitutional Court, with both judicial and legislative powers, created under Article V, Section 1 and Section 18 of the Texas Constitution. As a Constitutional Court, the Brazos County Commissioners Court also possesses the power to issue a Contempt of Court Citation under Section 81.024 of the Texas Local Government Code. Accordingly, members of the public in attendance at any Regular, Special and/or Emergency meeting of the Court shall conduct themselves with proper respect and decorum in speaking to, and/or addressing the Court; in participating in public discussions before the Court; and in all actions in the presence of the Court. Those members of the public who are inappropriately attired and/or who do not conduct themselves in an orderly and appropriate manner will be ordered to leave the meeting. Refusal to abide by the Court's Order and/or continued disruption of the meeting may result in a Contempt of Court Citation.

It is not the intention of the Brazos County Commissioners Court to provide a public forum for the demeaning of any individual or group. Neither is it the intention of the Court to allow a member (or members) of the public to insult the honesty and/or integrity of the Court, as a body, or any member or members of the Court, or County employees, individually or collectively. Accordingly, profane, insulting or threatening language directed toward the Court and/or any person in the Court's presence and/or racial, ethnic or gender slurs or epithets will not be tolerated. Violation of these rules may result in the following sanctions:

- 1, cancellation of a speaker's time;
- 2. removal from the Commissioners Court;
- 3. a Contempt Citation; and/or
- 4. such other and/or criminal sanctions as may be authorized under the Constitution, Statutes and Codes of the State of Texas.

The County Commissioners Court can deliberate or take action only if a matter has been listed on an agenda properly posted prior to the meeting. During the public comment period, speakers may address matters not listed on the published agenda. The Open Meeting Law does not expressly prohibit responses to public comments by the Commissioners Court. However, responses from the County Judge or Commissioners to unlisted public comment topics could become deliberation on a matter without notice to the public. To ensure the public has notice of all matters the Commissioners Court will consider, the County Judge and/or Commissioners may choose not to respond to public comments, except to correct factual inaccuracies, recite existing policy in response to an inquiry or to ask that a matter be listed on a future agenda. See Texas Open Meetings Act Section 551.042.

#### INVOCATION

Any invocation that may be offered before the official start of the Court meeting shall be to and for the benefit of the Court. The views or beliefs expressed by the invocation speaker have not been previously reviewed or approved by the Court and do not necessarily represent the religious beliefs or views of the Court in part or as a whole. No member of the community is required to attend or participate in the invocation and such decision will have no impact on their right to actively participate in the business of the Court.






### What We Capture

#### **Expo Events**

The Brazos County Expo hosted 176 events over 322 days in Fiscal Year 2016, compared with 159 events over 305 days in FY2015. Annual attendance was estimated at 92,216, up from 72,405 in FY2015. Additionally, the Brazos Valley Fair hosted 16,000 participants and attendees, bringing facility attendance to 108,216. Person-days totaled 147,971 in FY2016 as compared to 132,084 last year. Person-days totaled 163,971 including the fair. Table 1 shows the number of events, event days, attendance, and person-days by event type.

The table above includes partnership events. Partnership events held at the Expo likely would have been held in Brazos County even if the Expo did not exist. Partnerships reflect the availability of the Expo for local events such as the fundraisers, weddings, meetings, educational events, and corporate parties. These partnership events are not included in the analysis of spending and economic impacts although they provide an important service to local residents and businesses. Local service events include services for county residents, including health screening and livestock validation. Again, there is no visitor impact, but the services are important to local residents.

Revenue-generation is a priority for Expo management and staff, but Expo visitors generate more economic activity in Brazos County outside the complex than within it. Crompton and Culpepper note that publically owned facilities are often important parts of the economy because they attract visitors and non-local spending. Indeed, such facilities are often built with a goal of garnering such outside spending as well as providing a venue for local events and fostering pride in the community through hosting a variety of events. The spending component of the facility's purpose suggests the appropriateness of an economic impact study.

#### **Visitor Spending by Event Category**

Expo staff survey event participants throughout the year to determine how much they are spending at hotels, restaurants, etc. Each event, and each individual participant, has a different expenditure pattern, although similar types of events tend to produce similar spending patterns. A different sample of events is surveyed each year in order to capture the spending patterns of a broad array of events. In addition to 2016 spending, an inflation-adjusted three-year-average of spending is used to improve the reliability of expenditure data as the survey captures these different events. Only responses from visitors to the county are used to calculate spending impacts, and only the non-local portion of event participants is included in the economic analysis.

Spending averages are weighted by person-days for each of the surveyed events in each event category. The 2014-2016 average and the 2016 calculation are presented in Tables 2 and 3 to provide a range of expenditures and impacts. Only the three-year-average is discussed in the text. Overall spending in 2016 was higher relative to the three-year average of \$5.6 million, although spending was lower in 2016 for the trade shows and rodeos after accounting for non-local access fees. Horse show and conference/career fair spending were up sharply in 2016. Again, this variation is largely a function of events surveyed from year to year and highlights the importance of focusing on the average spending, which includes a broader and thus more representative range of spending patterns.

It should be noted that only access fees that remain in the Brazos County economy are included in spending. For example, if an event is hosted by local organizers, fees are included in the analysis. If an event is hosted by an association headquartered outside the county, fees for that event are not included the spending totals reported above and used in the impact analysis. This is accomplished by only applying person-day access fees to non-local person-days for events organized within Brazos County. All other access fees are excluded from the analysis.

#### **Economic Impacts of Expo Events in the Brazos County Economy**

The direct spending by visitors to the Expo Complex is not the only benefit to the local economy. Economic contribution analysis is based on the idea that a dollar spent in a region stimulates additional economic activity, or multiplies as it circulates through the economy. This multiplier effect recognizes that the total effect on output, employment, personal income, and government revenue in the region is greater than the initial dollar spent. A visitor's expenditure at a local restaurant or store contributes not only to that business, but to its suppliers and its suppliers' suppliers (the indirect effect), the incomes of each of their employees who then spend their earnings (the induced effect), and tax revenues. Of course, some of the original expenditure leaks out of the regional economy, for example as inventory is imported from other regions, employees commute from other regions, and businesses and households pay state and federal taxes.

Multipliers are calculated based on the purchasing patterns of industries and institutions in the regional economy. The total effects are the sum of direct, indirect and induced for each of the outcomes: employment, labor income, total value added (contribution to gross regional project) and output (gross sales). Only expenditures by visitors are included in the economic impact analysis because their spending represents new money in the county economy. It is assumed that local county residents might have spent their money elsewhere in the county if they had not attended an Expo event; thus, there is no economic impact. Access fees are excluded from the impact analysis because the fee is often paid to an event sponsor located outside Brazos County, and much of the fee is likely an immediate leakage from the local economy.

Four types of multiplier effects are reported in the impact analyses. The *Output or sales multiplier* measures the effect of external spending on overall economic activity in the region. The output multiplier provides the largest economic impact value and therefore is reported in many studies; however, the output multiplier says nothing about how the event affects the welfare of households or the profitability of businesses.

The *value-added multiplier* is a more appropriate measure of regional welfare. The value-added multiplier measures Expo visitors' contribution to regional gross domestic product (GDP). It is the value added to the regional economy or the return to local resources used in the production of goods and services in Brazos County.

The *labor income multiplier* is part of the value-added multiplier but is often reported alone. The wage and proprietor's income multiplier measures the effect of final demand spending on the incomes of households in the region and is appropriate for discerning the benefit of an event to a region's residents.

The *employment multiplier* measures the effect of the event on regional employment. Calculation of the employment multiplier assumes that existing employees are fully occupied and does not distinguish between full-time and part-time workers.

#### Horse Shows

Horse shows made up 20 of 176 events at the Expo. Using 2014-2016 average spending, an estimated \$1.8 million was spent by out-of-county participants and attendees at the 20 Expo horse shows in FY 2016, resulting in an economic impact of \$2.4 million in output and 26.4 jobs (Tables 4 and 5).

#### Livestock Shows

Livestock shows made up 13 events. An estimated \$900,600 was spent by out-of-county livestock show participants and attendees at those 13 events (using 2014-2016 average spending), resulting in an economic impact of \$1.3 million in output and 13.9 jobs (Tables 6 and 7).

## Dog Shows

The Expo hosted its first major dog show in FY2015 and hosted three much smaller dog events in FY2016. Those events were not surveyed so impacts are estimated based on inflated 2015 spending. An estimated \$20,100 was spent by nonlocal dog show participants and attendees, resulting in an economic impact of \$27,300 in output (Table 8).

#### Rodeos and Other Equine Events

The expo hosted 17 rodeos, ropings, and barrel races in 2016. An estimated \$2.1 million was spent by out-of-county rodeo and other equine event participants and attendees at those 17 events, resulting in an economic impact of \$2.8 million in output and 26.6 jobs (Tables 9 and 10).

#### Miscellaneous Spectator Events

The Expo hosted nine miscellaneous spectator events in 2016, including sporting events and car shows. This category, while not new, is a growing share of Expo business. Spectator events were not surveyed in 2016, but these events have a profile similar to rodeos so the rodeo spending pattern was used to estimate the impact of these miscellaneous spectator events. Future efforts will focus on surveying spectator evens. Spending by nonlocal participants was estimated at \$192,100, resulting in an economic impact of \$258,100 in output and 2.8 jobs (Tables 11 and 12).

#### Conferences and Career Fairs

Ten conferences and career fairs were held in 2016. Aggregate average spending of \$421,400 by nonlocal attendees at those six career fairs and four conferences was associated with an economic impact of \$585,700 in output and 5.6 jobs (Table 13). Differences between the figures in Tables 13 and 14 reflect 2016 spending that was sharply higher than in the previous two years, although 2016 spending levels remained well below 2013 conference spending. The results show the variation in spending between events and highlight the importance of focusing on the three-year-average.

#### Trade Shows

The Expo hosted 14 trade shows in 2016. An estimated \$169,100 was spent by out-of-county participants (primarily vendors) at those events, resulting in an economic impact of \$227,800 in output and 2.3 jobs (Table 15). No trade shows were surveyed in 2016, so 2016 impacts are calculated using inflated 2015 spending (Table 16). The 2015 spending levels were much lower than the 2014 spending included in the three-year-average.

#### **Summary**

Across the seven types of events studied, nonlocal visitors to the Expo spent an estimated \$5.5 million, calculated by average FY 2014-2016 spending. This figure is the direct output effect in Table 17 and excludes access fees paid to entities outside the region. These visitors contributed approximately \$7.6 million in total sales, \$4.0 million in value added (GDP), \$2.0 million in labor income, and 77.9 full and part-time jobs across the county economy. Value added and labor income are subsets of GDP, so these figures cannot be summed.

When relying solely on 2016 reported spending, overall impact was higher due to higher spending per person-day was higher at horse shows and at conferences and careers fairs surveyed in 2016 (Table 18). Conversely, the latest reported spending was lower than average at rodeos after accounting for non-local access fees and at trade shows. Relative to 2015, larger impacts also reflect a 12% increase in person-days at the Expo.

The above estimate does not include the contribution of the Brazos Valley Fair & Expo. Furthermore, it does not reflect the expenditures of people attending wedding receptions and other private events at the Expo. Nor does it reflect the value of expenditures by locals attending Expo events or the value of having a venue where locals can host and attend community events.

The growth in total economic output attributable to the Expo has been at least 10% annually since 2013, when the first full study was completed. Output growth topped 20% in 2016, driven by higher spending and a larger number of person-days. Outputs reported in Table 19 are based on two- or three-year average spending (only two years of data were availabe in 2013). These figures are presented as shown in previous reports and are not further adjusted for inflation. Employment has been more stable and is dependent upon the purchasing patterns by surveyed participants as well as relationships between employees and industries in the economy.

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

#### RESOLUTION

- A. WHEREAS, Chapter 791 of the TEXAS GOVERNMENT CODE, also known as the INTERLOCAL COOPERATION ACT, authorizes all local government entities to contract with each other to provide a governmental function or service that each party to the contract is authorized to perform individually and in which the contracting parties are mutually interested; and
- B. WHEREAS, College Station Independent School District ("CSISD"), and Brazos County, Texas ("County") are local government entities, each acting by and through their duly authorized agents (collectively, the "Parties"); and
- C. WHEREAS, CSISD, pursuant to the authority granted under Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code, desires to enter the School Resource Deputy Interlocal Agreement attached hereto as Exhibit A ("ILA"), for the purpose of participating with the County in the placement of a School Resource Deputy in certain CSISD facilities; and
- D. WHEREAS, CSISD agrees that the ILA will mutually benefit each Party and will further each Party's governmental purpose; and
- E. WHEREAS, the Board desires to authorize the execution of the ILA by CSISD, and to authorize the Board President, the Superintendent or their appointed designees, to do any and all things necessary to carry out the terms of the ILA, and take all other action contemplated thereby.

NOW, THEREFORE, on motion made and seconded, it is hereby resolved that:

- The terms and conditions of the ILA, and any other documents necessary to effectuate the ILA, are found to be acceptable and in the best interest of CSISD and its citizens, and are hereby in all things approved.
- 2. The Board further resolves that the ILA as approved by this resolution is in conformity with the Texas Government Code.
- 3. The Board further authorizes the Board President to execute the ILA on behalf of CSISD, and further authorizes the Board President, the Superintendent or their appointed designees, to do any and all things necessary to carry out the terms of the ILA, and take all other action contemplated thereby.

# SCHOOL RESOURCE DEPUTY INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN BRAZOS COUNTY AND the COLLEGE STATION INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

This Interlocal Governmental Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into between the County of Brazos, ("County") a political subdivision of the State of Texas, acting by and through its County Commissioner's Court and the College Station Independent School District ("CSISD" or "the District"), a political subdivision of the State of Texas, acting by and through its Board of Trustees, collectively ("Parties"). Both Parties acknowledge the continuing need for a School Resource Deputy ("SRD") Program for CSISD. The Parties agree to establish a SRD Program in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth herein.

WHEREAS, Chapter 791 of the TEXAS GOVERNMENT CODE, also known as the INTERLOCAL COOPERATION ACT, authorizes all local governments to contract with each other to provide a governmental function or service that each party to the contract is authorized to perform individually and in which the contracting Parties are mutually interested; and

WHEREAS, the Parties have sufficient funds available from current revenues to perform the functions contemplated by this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the County has, prior to this Agreement, established a SRD Program with law enforcement deputies from the Brazos County Sheriff's Office ("BCSO"); and

WHEREAS, the Parties recognize the outstanding benefits of the SRD Program to the citizens of Brazos County and to the students of CSISD; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the Parties, the citizens of Brazos County, and the students of CSISD to establish the SRD Program; and

WHEREAS, County is willing to participate in the Agreement with the understanding that the financial burden to Brazos County tax payers is a net zero; and

NOW, THEREFORE IN CONSIDERATION of the recitals and mutual covenants made herein by the County and CSISD to be respectively kept and performed, the Parties hereby mutually agree as follows:

### ARTICLE I

The following terms shall have the following meanings when used in this Agreement:

1.1 The Sheriff means the elected Brazos County Sheriff and shall also apply to any person designated by the Sheriff to act on their behalf in regards to this Agreement.

- 1.2 School Superintendent means the CSISD School Superintendent and shall also apply to any person designated by the Superintendent to act on their behalf in regards to this Agreement.
- 1.3 Law Enforcement Deputy means any BCSO Deputy who is commissioned under Texas law.
- 1.4 Law Enforcement Duties means any duties performed by any Law Enforcement Deputy.
- 1.5 School Resource Deputy (SRD) means any Law Enforcement Deputy assigned to and aiding the administration and student bodies of selected CSISD campuses and facilities. The SRD's general responsibilities are to provide security and crime prevention services in schools. The SRD's role may be divided into three areas: Educator, Informal Counselor, and Law Enforcement Deputy.

# ARTICLE II MISSION AND PURPOSE

- 2.1 The mission of the SRD program is the reduction and prevention of school-related violence and crime committed by juveniles and young adults, the reduction of the fear of crime on school campuses, and building effective partnerships with the faculty and staff of CSISD. This is accomplished by assigning Law Enforcement Deputies to school facilities. The SRD Program accomplishes this mission by creating and maintaining safe, secure and orderly learning environments for students, teachers, and staff.
- 2.2 The SRDs will establish a trusting channel of communication with students, parents, and teachers. SRDs will serve as a positive role model to instill in students good moral standards, good judgment and discretion, respect for other students, and a sincere concern for the school community. SRDs will promote citizen awareness of the law to enable students to become better informed and effective citizens, while empowering students with the knowledge of law enforcement efforts and obligations regarding enforcement as well as consequences for violations of the law.
- 2.3 SRDs will serve as a confidential source of counseling for students and parents concerning problems they face as well as providing information on community resources available to them. Goals and objectives are designed to develop and enhance rapport between youth, police Deputies, and school administrators.

# ARTICLE III TERM AND TERMINATION

**3.1** This Agreement begins on March 1, 2017, and shall end, unless extended, on February 28, 2022, at midnight (5) years.

**3.2** Any Party may terminate its participation in this agreement by providing one hundred eighty (180) days written notice. In the event of termination of this agreement, compensation shall be made to the County for all SRD services performed to the date of termination.

### ARTICLE IV SCHOOL ASSIGNMENTS

- 4.1 The Sheriff shall assign SRDs to the following school campuses on a full time basis during the Fall and Spring Semesters of the school year. During the Summer Session, SRDs will periodically patrol the schools on a part time basis during the Summer months when school is not in regular session. The Parties shall review SRD needs for any upcoming school year in as timely a fashion as possible.
  - a. One (1) SRD at A&M Consolidated High School to primarily act as a law enforcement presence, mentor, problem-solver, and provide positive police-student relations.
  - b. One (1) SRD at College Station High School to primarily act as a law enforcement presence, mentor, problem-solver, and provide positive police-student relations.
  - c. One (1) SRD at College Station Middle School, to primarily act as a law enforcement presence, mentor, problem-solver, and provide positive police-student relations.
  - d. One (1) SRD at A&M Consolidated Middle School, to primarily act as a law enforcement presence, mentor, problem-solver, and provide positive police-student relations.
  - e. One (1) SRD Sergeant, supervisor of SRDs, to split time between College View High School and the Center for Alternative Learning, to primarily act as a law enforcement presence, mentor, problem-solver, and provide positive police-student relations. The Sergeant shall be provided an office separate and apart from school administrative offices.
- **4.2** In the sole discretion of the Sheriff but after consultation with the CSISD, the Sheriff may adjust the amount of time spent by each SRD at each campus.
- **4.3** Any SRD assignments to other CSISD schools will be negotiated in advance of the school year and shall be governed under the same terms set forth in this Agreement.

# ARTICLE V SRD DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

#### Generally

The services to be provided by County to CSISD are law enforcement activities to be performed primarily on the designated campuses by SRDs. During the term of this contract, each SRD will work a total of 2080 hours during each twelve (12) month period inclusive of Permissible Leave as described below. Each SRD shall perform their duties in accordance with three general areas: Administrative, Law Enforcement, and Educational and Counseling.

### 5.1 Administrative Duties

- a. SRDs will check in with designated school staff upon arriving on campus and will report with school staff prior to leaving campus, unless circumstances prevent the SRD from checking in or out.
- **b.** The day-to-day operation and administrative control of the SRD Program will be the responsibility of the BCSO. Responsibility for the conduct of SRD personnel, both personally and professionally, shall remain with the BCSO... SRDs shall remain employees of the BCSO and shall not be employees of the CSISD.
- **c.** All acts of commission shall conform to the guidelines of the BCSO's Policy and Procedure Manual.
- d. SRDs will not enforce school or house rules, SRDs are not school disciplinarians and will not assume that role. However, if the principal or other staff believes an incident involves a violation of the law, the principal or staff member may contact the SRD and the SRD will determine whether law enforcement action is appropriate.

### 5.2 Law Enforcement Duties

- Enforce the laws of the State of Texas.
- **b.** Assist CSISD in maintaining lawful order on school property while in full BCSO uniform at all times or other apparel approved by the BCSO.
- Protect the students, teachers, staff, and public against criminal activity.
- d. Take enforcement action on criminal matters according to BCSO policy. As soon as practical, the SRD shall make the principal of the school aware of such action. At the principal's request, the SRD shall take appropriate law enforcement action against intruders and unwanted guests who may appear at

the school and school functions, to the extent that the SRD may do so under the authority of law.

- e. Gather information regarding potential problems such as gang activity, criminal activity, and student unrest and handle initial reports of crimes committed on campus during school hours
- f. Coordinate investigative procedures between law enforcement and school administrators that follow BCSO Policy.
- **g.** Conduct investigations of criminal violations (with the exception of major criminal violations such as murder or sexual assault in which instance the Deputies will assist the law enforcement agency with primary jurisdiction) occurring on CSISD property or at CSISD-sponsored or school-related activities.

### 5.3 Educational and Counseling Duties

- a. Provide information about law enforcement topics to students and staff.
- **b.** Provide informational programs for CSISD staff, students, and parents on a variety of topics including, but not limited to issues related to alcohol and other drugs, criminal law, violence, gangs, safety and security.
- **c.** Refer students and their families to the appropriate agencies for assistance when the need is determined.
- **d.** Maintain good communication between BCSO and CSISD administration, principals, and staff.
- **e.** SRDs will not replace any school counselor nor are they to conduct or offer any formal psychological testing or counseling.
- **f.** SRDs will give advice to help resolve issues between students that involve matters that may result in a criminal violation, disturbances, and disruptions.
- **g.** SRDs should not go to the home of a student without another deputy or school administrator. When a visit is warranted, it should be reported to the SRD supervisor as soon as practical.
- h. Student confidentiality should be maintained, unless the gravity of the situation dictates otherwise to the extent permitted under law.

# 5.4 Regular Hours, Vacation, Personal Leave, Overtime, and Training Responsibilities

- a. Each SRD shall be assigned on a full-time basis for eight (8) hours, on those days and during those hours that the school is in regular session
- **b.** The SRD hours and days of work are to be considered flexible and may be changed to meet the needs of the BCSO or at the direction of the Sheriff.
- c. Before taking any personal leave time, the school principal must be made aware of the SRDs absence. Each SRD will follow the BCSO leave policy; however, no deputy may take personal leave/vacation time during the school year without prior approval from their BCSO supervisor.
- d. When a SRD is temporarily absent from their assigned campus for training or other reasons on a day that the school is in session, the BCSO will make reasonable efforts to provide a police presence for that campus by assigning other SRDs or deputies. When a deputy is needed on campus at times when the SRD or other deputy is not on campus, school personnel should call the BCSO dispatch at the non-emergency number 979-361-3888/4980 or dial 9-1-1 in case of an emergency.
- e. SRDs are subject to current policy and procedures that are in effect for all BCSO Deputies, including attendance at all mandated training and testing to maintain state peace officer licensing and certification. This training and certification takes place throughout the year and may necessitate the temporary absence of the SRD from his or her assigned campus.
- For purposes of this Agreement, the term "Extracurricular Assignments" means law enforcement services provided by law enforcement personnel at CSISD events that occur outside of their regularly scheduled duty day. Extracurricular Assignments are expressly excluded from the purview of this Agreement, CSISD shall establish and operate its own program for appointment of law enforcement personnel from various law enforcement jurisdictions located in Brazos County to Extracurricular Assignments, as further described in Exhibit "A", separate and apart from this Agreement and independent of their employment with the County. To the extent that any Deputy performing services under this Agreement voluntarily participates in the CSISD Extracurricular Assignment Program, such Extracurricular Assignment shall be compensated under the terms of that Program and shall not be considered service under the terms of this Agreement for any purpose. No Deputy shall be expected to, required or instructed by any CSISD official or the SRD supervisor or any other County employee to participate in the Extracurricular Assignment Program. Though the County and CSISD believe that the Extracurricular Assignments Program is subject to the "Special detail work" exception to overtime requirements under the Fair Labor Standards Act pursuant to 29 USC § 207(P), if the performance of Extracurricular Assignment work results in any Deputy(s) working overtime hours legally compensable by the County, and the Deputy is classified as non-exempt under the Fair Labor Standards Act, then CSISD shall

be responsible for the appropriate overtime rates for the compensable overtime hours worked in that work period, as set forth below in Consideration.

### ARTICLE VI SELECTION, TRANSFER AND REMOVAL OF SRD

- 6.1 Notice of SRD job openings will be made to all Law Enforcement Deputies at BCSO through regular postings. BCSO policy at the time of the opening will be followed during the selection process for SRDs. The Deputy(s) will be interviewed by a board consisting of BCSO representatives as determined by the Sheriff and representatives of the school for which the SRD will be assigned as determined by the school principal. The Sheriff or his appointed designee will make the final decision on all appointments or assignments related to the SRD program.
- 6.2 Reserved
- **6.3** An SRD may request to transfer to another school if the request meets the approval of the principals of each affected school and the Sheriff or his appointed designee.
- 6.4 If the CSISD is dissatisfied with the performance of a SRD, the district will notify the SRD supervisor who will attempt to resolve the issue to the satisfaction of both the school district and the police department. If the SRD supervisor cannot resolve the issue, he/she will refer the issue with a recommended course of action to the Sheriff or his appointed designee.
- **6.5** The BCSO may take appropriate corrective or disciplinary action regarding any allegation of misconduct on the part of a SRD in accordance with BCSO policy and procedures.
- **6.6** The Sheriff or his appointed designee may dismiss or reassign a SRD when it is in the best interest of the County or CSISD.
- 6.7 In the event of a resignation, retirement, dismissal, or reassignment of a SRD, or in case of long-term absences by a SRD, BCSO will provide a temporary replacement for the SRD within thirty (30) school days of receiving notice of such absence, dismissal, resignation, retirement, reassignment. As soon as practical, an interview board shall convene and recommend a permanent replacement for the SRD position.

# ARTICLE VII SCHOOL DISTRICT RESPONSIBILITIES

**7.1** CSISD will provide the SRD with a portable two-way radio or program an existing radio to enable SRDs to communicate directly with the school administration.

- **7.2** CSISD will provide the SRDs with access to an office that allows for security and privacy, with the exception of AMCMS. The office must include, but is not limited to, a telephone, desk with lockable drawers, chair, office supplies, filing cabinet, which can be properly locked and secured, and computer.
- **7.3 CSISD** will provide opportunities for SRDs to address teachers and school administrators about the SRD program's goals and objectives and provide SRDs the opportunity to address teachers and school administrators about criminal justice problems relating to students during in-service workdays.
- 7.4 Reserved.
- **7.5 CSISD will seek** input from SRDs regarding criminal justice problems relating to students.

#### 7.6 Patrol Vehicles

- a. CSISD will provide a BCSO Patrol Vehicle for each SRD for their use in their duties and for emergency calls as needed. This vehicle will be used by SRDs for the safety and security of the faculty and students of the school. In accordance with the BCSO policy and procedures, these vehicles will be considered a take home vehicle. CSISD will pay 100% of the purchase price and equipping cost of each vehicle.
- b. Patrol Vehicle(s), will at all times be the property of CSISD. CSISD will pay all of the expenses related to fuel, repairs, maintenance, insurance, and any associated costs for Patrol Vehicle(s).
- c. CSISD will pay for all repairs, upkeep and other associated costs for the life of the Patrol Vehicle(s).

# ARTICLE VIII SALARY AND BENEFITS OF SRD

- **8.1** CSISD agrees to reimburse the County for 100% of the SRD salaries (and any earned overtime) and fringe benefits (e.g. Total Wages, Certification Pay/Work, Longevity Pay, Cost of Living Adjustments, Training Specialist Pay, Accidental Death & Dismemberment, Group Insurance Employer Paid, Group Life Insurance (WB), Long Term Disability, Medicare Portion/Social Security, Social Security Employer Paid, TCDRS, Unemployment Compensation, and Worker's Compensation Insurance).
- **8.2** Parties agree to meet annually, prior to the beginning of the next school year, to negotiate increases in salaries due to merit raises earned by SRDs.

- **8.3** CSISD shall pay all expenses related to off-duty security performed by BCSO personnel including those off-duty securities voluntarily performed by SRDs on a contractual basis at an agreed upon off-duty rate.
- 8.4 CSISD will pay 100% of the cost of all SRD specific and law enforcement related training and any associated travel costs.
- 8.5 The County will invoice CSISD quarterly.

# ARTICLE IX MISCELLANEOUS TERMS

- 9.1 Interlocal Cooperation Act. The Parties expressly acknowledge that each Party to this agreement is a local government as that term is defined in the Interlocal Cooperation Act. Nothing in this Agreement will be construed as a waiver or relinquished by either Party of its right to claim such exemptions, privileges and immunities as may be provided by law.
- **9.2** Amendment. The terms and conditions of this agreement may be amended upon mutual consent of all Parties. Mutual consent will be demonstrated by approval of each governing body of each Party hereto. No amendment to this agreement shall be effective and binding unless and until it is reduced to writing and signed by duly authorized representatives of all Parties.
- **9.3** Effective. This agreement shall become effective immediately upon execution by all Parties and shall continue in effect until terminated as provided herein.
- 9.4 Indemnification. Subject to the limitations as to damages and liability under the Texas Tort Claims Act, and without waiving its governmental immunity, each Party to this agreement agrees to hold harmless each other, its governing board, Deputies, agents, and employees for any liability, loss, damages, claims, or causes of action caused, or asserted to be caused, directly or indirectly by any other Party to this agreement, or any of its Deputies, agents or employees as a result of its performance under this agreement. However, any increase in County's liability insurance premium that results from an act by a SRD or CSISD shall be recovered from CSISD.
- **9.5** Consent to Suit. Nothing in this agreement will be construed as a waiver or relinquishment by any Party of its right to claim such exemptions, privileges and immunities as may be provided by law.
- **9.6** Invalidity. If any provision of this agreement shall be held invalid, illegal, or unenforceable by a court or other tribunal of competent jurisdiction, the validity, legality and enforceability of the remaining provisions shall not in any way be affected or

impaired thereby. The Parties shall use their best efforts to replace the respective provision or provisions of the agreement with legal terms and conditions approximating the original intent of the Parties.

**9.7** Notices. Any notices, approval, consent, or communications by one Party to another must be in writing and be personally delivered or sent by registered or certified United States Mail, properly addressed to the respective Parties as follows:

- 9.8 Entire Agreement. It is understood that this agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties and supersedes any and all prior agreements, arrangements, or understandings between the Parties relating to the subject matter. No oral understandings, statements, promises, or inducements contrary to the terms of this agreement exist. This agreement cannot be changed or terminated orally. No verbal agreement or conversation with any Deputy, agent, or employee of any Party before or obligations hereunder.
- 9.9 Texas Law. This agreement has been made under and shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas.
- **9.10** Venue. Performance and all matters related thereto shall be in Brazos County, Texas, United States of America.
- **9.11** Authority to Contract. Each Party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform this agreement and the person signing this agreement on behalf of each Party has been properly authorized and empowered to enter into this agreement. The persons executing this agreement hereby represent that they have authorization to sign on behalf of their respective Governmental Bodies.
- 9.12 Waiver. Failure of any Party, at any time, to enforce the provision of this agreement, shall in no way constitute a waiver of that provision, nor in any way affect the validity of this agreement, any part hereof, or the right of either Party thereafter to enforce each and every provision hereof. No term of this agreement shall be deemed waived or breach excused unless the waiver shall be in writing and signed by the party claimed to have waived. Furthermore, any consent to or waiver of a breach will not constitute consent to or waiver of or excuse of any other different or subsequent breach.

- **9.13** Agreement Read. The Parties acknowledge that they have read, understand, and intend to be bound by the terms and conditions of this agreement.
- **9.14** Assignment. This agreement and the rights and obligations contained herein may not be assigned by any Party without prior written approval of the other Party to this agreement.
- **9.15** Multiple Originals. It is understood and agreed that this agreement may be executed in a number of identical counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original for all purposes.

#### ORDER FOR EMERGENCY AMENDMENT FISCAL YEAR 2017

This Order for Emergency Amendment to the Brazos County Adopted Budget for Fiscal Year 2017 ("Amendment") is entered into by the County of Brazos, ("County") a political subdivision of the State of Texas, acting by and through its County Commissioner's Court ("Court"). The County acknowledges the continuing need for a School Resource Deputy ("SRD") Program for the College Station Independent School District ("CSISD"). The County has agreed to establish a SRD Program in accordance with the terms and conditions of an interlocal agreement.

Following the adoption of the Brazos County Budget for Fiscal Year 2017 ("Budget"), CSISD notified the County that the College Station Police Department ("CSPD") would terminate its agreement to provide school resource officers ("SRO") to CSISD. The County recognizes the outstanding benefits of the SRO program to the citizens of Brazos County and to the students of CSISD.

A SRO or SRD is a career law enforcement officer with sworn authority, who is deployed by an employing agency in a community-oriented policing assignment to work in collaboration with one or more schools. SRO or SRD programs provide safe learning environments in our schools, provide valuable resources to school staff members, foster positive relationships with youth, develop strategies to resolve problems affecting youth and protect all students, so they can reach their fullest potentials.

It is in the best interest of the citizens of Brazos County, and the students of CSISD to continue to provide for the safety of the community's students and citizens by the establishment of a school resource deputy ("SRD") Program.

In order to establish the SRD program, the County finds that it is necessary to amend its Budget to add the following new positions:

- a. One (1) SRD at A&M Consolidated High School to primarily act as a law enforcement presence, mentor, problem-solver, and provide positive police-student relations.
- b. One (1) SRD at College Station High School to primarily act as a law enforcement presence, mentor, problem-solver, and provide positive police-student relations.
- c. One (1) SRD at College Station Middle School, to primarily act as a law enforcement presence, mentor, problem-solver, and provide positive police-student relations.
- d. One (1) SRD at A&M Consolidated Middle School, to primarily act as a law enforcement presence, mentor, problem-solver, and provide positive police-student relations.

One (1) SRD Sergeant, supervisor of SRDs, to split time between College View High School and the Center for Alternative Learning, to primarily act as a law enforcement presence, mentor, problem-solver, and provide positive police-student relations.

The County understands that CSISD will reimburse the County for all costs to administer the SRD program.

Texas Local Government Code §111.010(c) provides that: "The commissioners court may authorize an emergency expenditure as an amendment to the original budget only in a case of grave public necessity to meet an unusual and unforeseen condition that could not have been included in the original budget through the use of reasonably diligent thought and attention. If the court amends the original budget to meet an emergency, the court shall file a copy of its order amending the budget with the county clerk, and the clerk shall attach the copy to the original budget."

The Court finds that the emergency expenditure as an amendment to the original budget is authorized because the County is the only reasonable agency authorized to administer the SRD program and the discontinuation of any SRO or SRD program would constitute a grave public threat to the safety of CSISD students and the citizens of Brazos County.

The Court further finds that the untimely termination of the CSPD SRO program was an unforeseen condition that could not have been included in the original budget through the use of reasonably diligent thought and attention.

The Road & Bridge Department is seeking approval for Claim on Driveway Damage.

Brazos County Road & Bridge entered into a Road Improvement Contract in Summer 2016 for work on portions of Indian Lakes Drive and Anasazi Bluff Drive.

The work generally consisted of reclaiming existing road materials for use as an improved subgrade; construction of new base course and surfacing. Incidental work included cutting and removal of portions of driveway so that they would better intersect with the new profile grades of the reconstructed roadways. The driveway incidental work was successful except for one address.

The driveway at 18402 Anasazi Bluff is circular with a "washed gravel" finish. It was sawcut by the Road & Bridge Department cleanly, however during the concrete removal portion of the operation a large crack developed (traversing the sawcut). The damage was noted at the time and Commissioner Wasserman met with the property owners to inform them that we would "make it right".

The Tate's have obtained cost information from their original homebuilder (memo and estimate attached) and are seeking to settle a claim with Brazos County for the repair of the driveway. I have discussed the issue with both Tracy and Lea Ann Tate extensively. The area identified in the letter is accurate.

The cost of these services is not to exceed \$5800 as itemized below. I have reviewed the proposed scope and the proposed rates.

- Removal and replacement of 328 sq. ft......\$5300.00
- Check/Repair Lawn Irrigation upon completion......\$250.00
- Replace Landscape Rocks, sod, grading as needed......\$250.00

I find the costs of services shown to be fair and recommend approval of claim and issuance of a Purchase Order to the Tate's for the repairs of damages. If culvert is damaged upon removal, this department will replace at our cost.
