Judge Kacal called for public comment.

Cathie Viens, resident of Precinct 4, addressed the Court concerning the calculations of the tax rate.

Budget Officer Nina Payne and First Assistant County Auditor Marci Turner provided clarification.

Judge Kacal stated we are moving toward better transparency.

John Book, resident of Precinct 2, addressed the Court concerning the Tax Rate.

Cindy Wylie, resident of Precinct 1, addressed the Court concerning the Tax Rate. Ms. Wylie submitted her statements for the minutes, it is attached hereto. Judge Kacal and Commissioner Nettles provided clarification.

Judge Kacal called for comments from the Court.

Commissioner Watson stated that the Court wants to provide the best services to the community while being fiscally responsible.

Commissioner Brown expressed his concerns with the financial situation the County is currently in due to the Comptroller and Appraisal District.

Commissioner Konderla shared that he agrees with Commissioner Brown on his concerns for the position that the County is in. He also provided clarification on the proposed tax rate.


